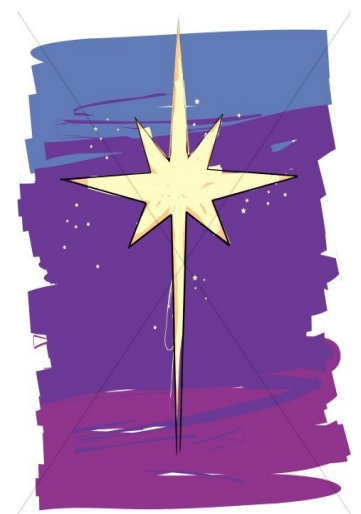

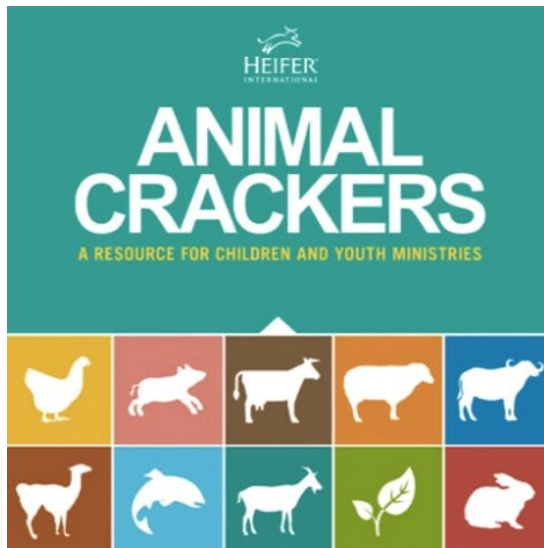

The last eleven weeks has been interesting to say the least. It has also been a craft bonanza, a learning experience (the difference between a bison and a water buffalo), and a time to have some serious discussions with the children of this church. As their teacher and guide through Animal Crackers, I feel that these children have an understanding of animals and plants around the world that are part God's creations. We have learned how families and communities use the gifts of Heifer International to improve their income, nutrition and standard of living. The important part of Heifer that I tried to stress each week is Passing the Gift. The children would talk about how each animal, tree seedling or irrigation project would allow the families

to begin to end hunger and poverty and pass the gift. Because of the Congregations generous donations to our Piggy Banks around the church \$1,615.91 was raised. The children have made a priority list of how to spend the money. They felt the most important animal they learned about was the cow followed very closely by chickens! I was surprised by their third item, irrigation. They all felt the impact of fresh drinking water was very important. These three are followed by rabbits, a pig, a llama and tree seedlings. If they had more money, which thanks to you they did, they would buy chickens. For \$20 Heifer provides a family with a starter flock of 10 to 50 chicks and since a good hen can lay up to 200 eggs a year it will provide a family with plenty of nutritious eggs to eat, share or sell. Because chickens require little space and can thrive on readily available food scraps, families can make money from the birds with out spending much. And chicken help control insects and fertilize gardens, add 3 more flocks of chickens! But because of your generous donations First Presbyterian Church will be donating a mating pair of cattle instead of a heifer. This will provide more than just nutritious milk to drink. Extra milk can be sold or made into cheese and yogurt. It will provide a valuable offspring, which can be raised or sold at market. Manure is also used to fertilize their crops and improve their harvests.

Thank you from the bottom of our hearts to each and everyone of you that has helped with Animal Crackers and the Heifer's 75th year Mission Project. Because our order for the animals was placed on #GivingTuesday our gift will be tripled!!

Tuesday, December 17th will be the last packing day for the semester. It should be a busy night because the packing for the holidays will be done that night. Let's plan to go to dinner afterwards, place to be determined by popular vote that night!

The dates for the spring semester Snack Pak packing have been set. Mark your calendars for these Tuesdays. January 28th, February 25th, March 24th, April 21st and May 19th.

Dress a Live Doll

These 8 children were from 2 families, 4 kids in each family, with the ages ranging from 5 years to 18 years. The notes on the older kids forms expressed a need for socks and underwear, something that I have never seen before. Wrapping of the gifts will be on the first Sunday of Advent, December 1st, as the gifts need to be delivered Saturday, December 7th. THE CHRISMON TREE

The evergreen tree, which symbolizes the eternal quality of life which our Savior has opened to us, is a background for tiny white lights and white and gold Chrismons. The lights speak of Him Who is the Light of the world, and the Chrismons (CHRIST + MONogram) proclaim the Name, the life and the saving acts of Jesus the Christ. White refers to our Lord's purity and perfection; gold, to His majesty and glory.

CROSSES

The cross is, of course, always a reminder of our Lord's saving work of redeeming humankind through his self-emptying example for extending forgiveness and salvation. Different forms of the cross may point to various aspects of our Christ's life and work.



- TAU CROSS (anticipatory, Old Testament, Advent): Salvation promised but not yet accomplished. Numbers 21.0; Isaiah 53.



- ANCHOR CROSS (Cross of Hope): This Child, the hope of the world; or, a cross rises from a crescent moon, a symbol for our Lord's mother. Hebrews 6.19; Luke 2.7.



- LATIN CROSS: Long upright; most widely used form of the cross among Christians.



- GREEK CROSS: all extensions of equal length. This balanced form is easier to use in designs and was much employed by early Greek artists.



- CROSS OVER THE WORLD: Christ over the world, "Go ye into all the world..."



- CROSS TRIMPHANT. A word united in Christ; triumph of the Lord over earthly sin.



- JERUSALEM CROSS: Four Tau crosses meet to form a larger cross: culminated in the crucifixion of our Lord (large cross) on a hill near Jerusalem. Since then His followers have carried the Gospel to the corners of the world (small corner crosses).



- CROSS IN ETERNITY



- EYE OF GOD (Ojo de Dios): A pre-Columbian art form reveals a cross in its weave.

MONOGRAMS AND LETTERS

The earliest monograms of our Lord are in Greek letters. Originally much of the New Testament was written in Greek because many of the first missionary churches were Greek.



- Chi, the first letter of the word for Christ in Greek.



- Chi Rho, the first letters of Christ in the Greek alphabet. Or, for the Latin 'Christus Rex', Christ the King. The X may sometimes become a cross.



IHC

- First three letters of Jesus in Greek. (Note: some letters have several forms.)



- Monogram of the first letters of Jesus and Christ; our Lord's cipher.



- Alpha and Omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. Since only God is before and after all things, a symbol of divinity. Revelation 22.13
